# For Such a Time as This

I originally wrote this article in mid-March with the understanding that things would probably change significantly by the time the Lux was published. Little did I know how quickly and drastically everything would change. Because of that I'm updating this article on Mar. 24, but for the most up to date information, please read the emails from the ULC office. If you are not on the email list, please give us your email addresses. If you don't have email, please call the church office so we can send you information through the mail as needed.

Throughout the Governor's stay at home order, the church office is closed, but we have forwarded phones to our cell phones. To reach Britny, Pastor Haley Vay or me, just dial the appropriate church extension or call our cell phones directly.

I am very grateful for Pastor Haley Vay and the ULC staff. They have stepped up and worked together as we've been finding our way through a very challenging situation. I am thankful for their gifts, flexibility, creativity, and cooperation. We are blessed by their presence.

One of the most difficult things about the current situation is that we don't know what will happen or what the future holds. The uncertainty is unnerving. I vacillate between being calm and collected to feeling a sense



of fear. I'm grateful for our Governor's stay at home order as I would rather be on the side of safety and doing things for the good of our people and the community at large. It is the faithful response.

In light of this public health crisis and amidst the uncertainty and unknown, there are two things that stand out for me.

First is a passage from Romans that has been a favorite of mine my whole ministry. I've read it at many funerals, including my grandparents' funerals. In Paul's words in Romans 8:37-39 No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

For me, these words express the deep truth that no matter what life brings, no matter what crisis we might face, we will never be separated from God's love. Nothing can separate us from the love of God, not even the Coronavirus. That empowers me!

Secondly, we are about to celebrate Easter and the resurrection of Jesus. The resurrection proclaims that even when death had done its worst, God triumphed. The deep, solid core of my faith is that we worship a God who brings life out of death. That isn't simply for when we die. It's all the time. Day in, day out, God is always at work to bring life out of death. I know that no matter what path the Coronavirus takes, this is Easter, and God will be at work to bring life out of death.

Even though we will not be able to gather in person at church to celebrate Easter, we will still gather in our homes in virtual worship to celebrate our life-giving God and God's power to bring life out of death. Fear, sickness, death and the Coronavirus will not have the last word. Jesus Christ who is risen from the dead has the last word! For I am convinced that neither death. nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

May the power of Easter strengthen you "for such a time as this,"



Hear these words from Jesus: "I am leaving you with a gift-peace of mind and heart. And the peace I give is a gift the world cannot give. So don't be troubled or afraid" (John 14:27). Jesus also said, "Can all your worries add a single moment to your life?...So don't worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring its own worries. Today's trouble is enough for today" (Matthew 6:27, 34).

#### Pray. Be still.

If you are able, untie your knots as a symbol of letting go of these worries and concerns and leaving them in God's capable hands.

## **Kristy Stuart Moves Onward and Upward**

Although all of us at University Lutheran are sad to see Kristy Stuart leave us, we must admit that she is embarking on an exciting and meaningful new mission. Kristy, who has served as ULC's Financial

Administrator for the past eighteen and a half years, is now a Candidate for Unitarian Universalist (UU) Ministry, planning to graduate from Meadville Lombard Theological School in Chicago this May.

"I felt a call to ministry while companioning the dying and their families as a Hospice of Lansing volunteer," Kristy told me. "I started exploring my call to ministry by doing a chaplaincy internship as discernment. I enrolled in seminary in the fall of 2017 as a full-time Divinity student."

Kristy will see the Unitarian Universalist Association's credentialing body, the Ministerial Fellowship Committee (MFC), for an interview on Mar. 28. If that interview is successful, she'll be accepted into Preliminary Fellowship as a UU Minister and will be ordained by the Grand Rapids congregation (where she has been a part-time intern minister for the past two years) and the UU Lansing congregation on June 20.



Kristy is a local girl. She was born at Sparrow Hospital and grew up and attended school in Williamston and Perry. She's married to husband Joe and the couple have two daughters, Shelby and

Megan. Religion has always been a part of her life. She was raised in an Evangelical Christian family and attended an Independent Baptist church as a girl. As an adult, she graduated, as she told me, to "evermore-liberal churches." She also attended ULC for a time before finding herself most at home in the Unitarian Universalist faith.

But her first career-call was not to the church but to accounting. Kristy has a B.A. in that field from Ferris State University. "I love accounting," she says. "I love the work." She worked at a variety of firms before joining the ULC staff. The financial administrator post here has been, she says, "The best job ever!"


"It was such a relief," she told me, "not to be working for an old white guy who wanted to make as much money as possible."

She's "thrilled to be a part of a supportive staff who want the best for the whole community." In Pastor Gary Bunge, she says, she's had "a really great boss." She has loved her whole experience at ULC in fact. Among the things she'll miss the most, "Having the congregants come in. Getting to know them and being able sometimes to help them." Some regrets, yes, but she's moving onward and upward to marvelous things.

"I'm currently interviewing for a Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) Residency position at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor." Kristy said. "CPE Residency programs train religious professionals to be certified chaplains to provide spiritual care in hospital, hospice, academic and other settings. The residency will run from August 2020 to August 2021."

She's not sure what will come after that, but she's "imagining a bivocational combination of hospice or hospital chaplaincy and parish ministry with a focus on administration, pastoral care and faith formation." I think we can all be certain that whatever she does, she will be a success and have a tremendous, positive effect on many people's lives.





### **The Fierce Urgency of Now**

For those who care about God's creation, the present time is one of crisis, and yet it is also a time of possibility. It is

a time in which the persistent call of God is reaching out to us amid climate threats, burning forests, and poisoned waters. The prophets of our faith have continually pointed to the need to act with all speed in a time of peril. In the first chapter of Mark, Jesus declares, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near." One of the Greek translations of "time" is the word **Kairos**, which signifies the fulfillment of the right action

at the right moment. Is this our Kairos moment? (creation justice.org)

In the words of Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. "We are now faced with the fact that tomorrow is today. We are confronted with the fierce urgency of now. In this unfolding conundrum of life and history there is such a thing as being too late. Procrastination is still the thief of time." King's words resonate for those addressing today's ecological crisis: now is the time for decisive action.



We are continually asking the question: What can we do to ensure a sustainable future? In this sustainable future,

> we must limit global warming to 2.9 degrees Fahrenheit, which would force societies to reduce fossil fuel consumption to just 13 percent of total energy production. That means quickly adopting clean energy, including wind and solar which is already cheaper (nearly half the price per megawatt) than coal and outpacing it for new capacity creation (Nature Conservancy 2020).

In addition to individual actions, the most critical action each of us can take is to support leaders who have a plan for stopping climate change in our lifetimes. Climate may not feel like the most pressing issue at times, but the science is clear: we have 10 years or less to get our emissions under control. That's it! What actions can we Christians take in this moment?

## **Craft Sales Replenish Supplies & Fund Tithes**

Because of the generosity of our congregation and friends who purchase items at our craft sales, the Prayers & Squares ministry is happy to tithe \$750 as a thank you for the blessings and support given us over the last 16 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> years. We began tithing several years ago after realizing that we had been blessed with more money than what was needed to support this growing ministry. We requested the money be used on something within ULC. Three new folding tables have been purchased for the Bell Choir that can also be used by other groups. The remainder is earmarked for the installation of electric door openers for the two downstairs restrooms.

We have also pledged to donate an equal amount to other ministries in the East Lansing area that highlight the goals of Prayers & Squares. The first donation of \$150 worth of bedding and towels was given to Safe Place, the domestic violence shelter at MSU. We will continue to inform you of further donations throughout the year.

Recently prayer quilt number 1906 was tied and presented. This only happened because of the many volunteers who participate by washing and pressing fabric, cutting quilt kits, sewing tops and backs, putting in tying threads, creating and printing the cards for everyone

to sign, making the bows for the care tags and other tasks too numerous to mention. But the most impressive thing about this entire ministry is how the members of ULC reach out to those in need of prayer, request and choose a quilt, and then deliver it to the recipient. You are the heart of Prayers & Squares.

Our next scheduled sewing day is Tuesday, April 14<sup>th</sup> in the Atrium at the bottom of the stairs at 9:00 a.m. until 12:30 p.m., however, it's likely we may not be able to meet together yet at that time. He knows he gets to keep the Otto book after he can read it without help and has already earned his first to keep. When he read me the new book for the first time yesterday, he retained all the sight words learned in the previous book which I thought was wonderful.

I remember one day after he had made progress reading and had been sure to share with me during creative play,

I told him "Jameer you did a great job sharing and reading today." He told every staff member we saw on the way back to his classroom that he was good at sharing and reading, and I could see how happy and confident this made him.

Another day I brought along craft items to make valentines including a hole punch to thread ribbons throughout some cut out hearts. He was so impressed that I let him use the hole punch telling me "You brought something really dangerous!" I realized that our oneon-one time allows him to try out something a little "dangerous" under direct supervision and again builds his confidence.

Most of all we have fun together. We ended yesterday's session in the staff bathroom practicing washing our hands while we sang Happy Birthday to each other. The school secretary was charmed by Jameer's enthusiasm for learning good hand hygiene from Mrs. Beth. I always leave with a big smile and know that he goes back to his classroom with his head held high and his own smile lighting up his face.

## A Look Back – Our Ministry to the University in 1958

In the March Lux, we shared some of the 1958 University Lutheran "State of Our Congregation" report by Reverend Charles Klinksick and Reverend Donald Herb. This report was found in the time capsule recently retrieved from the Education Annex of the Ann Street Church. Last month we covered the ministry to the community. This month we will reprint the report on the ministry to the university.

#### "Our Ministry to the University"

One of the joys and sorrows of our congregation is to find

itself obligated to the Lord to serve the great educational and research center of Michigan State University. Until a few years ago it was the program of the Lutheran Church to provide a ministry of tea and cookies to <u>students</u>. (This is not to forget the tremendous accomplishments of LSAA, which often saw its mission more clearly than the church itself.) Now the church challenges its members within the university to a full ministry of the Word and Sacramen

full ministry of the Word and Sacraments to <u>faculty</u>, <u>administration</u>, and <u>students</u>.

Through a series of historical accidents and the guidance of an understanding pastor, our congregation is in an almost unique position to fulfil this new concept of ministry. In many respects its opportunity is the subject of national envy. This does not mean that we automatically succeed, of course. It means, however, that we can be thankful for this "yoke of the Lord" and the way He has worked in the university through us. In this ministry the following has been done this year:

- A. Preaching and Worship During the academic year, over 300 students hear the Word of God. Together with faculty and administration, and their families, they make up by far the larger part of our congregation. Many unchurched and non-Lutheran guests are included. This is by far the best part of our University ministry.
- B. Preaching and Study Our ministry has made possible a section of Religion 101, in the MSU department of Religion, serving more than 100 students throughout the year.....
- C. Counseling...
- D. Recruiting Encouraging students and faculty to serve the church....
- E. Calling and Evangelism Married students are given a special emphasis in calling. Over 300 students in dormitories, rooming houses, fraternities, and sororities were contacted through student evangelists and "contacters." The university health center was visited as often as possible.
- F. Recreation A weak part of our program, but two or three parties were held. The student lounge is open daily.
- G. Service A woeful subject but our students did do babysitting for a congregational dinner, served on committees, as ushers, in the choir, in the nursery, in the auxiliaries, and as major leaders on the church council..."

### A Look Forward - Our Ministry to the Community in 2020

It was a different world described in the March Lux newsletter, when over 300 students (145 actual members) and 375 resident members flocked into the Ann Street church. Four crowded services began at 7:30 a.m. with the rest at one-hour intervals. Roger Hoopingarner said the choir sang at the end of the second and start of the third service, and communion was once a month. Pastor Herb Wolf, described as charismatic and especially good with young people, preached excellent ten-minute sermons in the short time before the next service. Weekdays, mothers stayed home with their children while their husbands worked.

While building the Ann Street church, members were already considering a Red Cedar area annex west of MSU. It was eventually decided to build the first segment of our architecturally striking Harrison Road church which was dedicated Jan. 30, 1972. An education wing would be added later because of the cost.

In 1968 people running for church office were asked to tell the most important issues facing ULC.

### 2020 North/West Lower Michigan Synod Assembly Cancelled

"Great is the Company of Those who Bore the Tidings, Great is the Company of the Women!" Psalm 68:11.

After prayerful reflection and in keeping with the recommendations of the Office of the Secretary and the Office of the Presiding Bishop, Bishop Satterlee recommended and Synod Council affirmed that we will NOT gather for Synod Assembly May 14-16, 2020 in Mount Pleasant. At this point, we are exploring whether we will have a re-scheduled shortened (half-day) assembly in the



fall for essential business or whether we will defer the next synod assembly until 2021. It is still too early to make this determination.

As a result, there will be no "Outreach of the Month" collection for April which was designated for the Synod Assembly offering.

Former member Roy Niemeyer wrote, "Relating God's Word to our members, the community, and the world."

What is our ministry to the community today? We allow 16 organizations to use our facility without cost. They include: Latvian worship, Citizen Vounteers for International Programs, Samaritas, Enhance Fitness, several community support groups, Sons of Norway, and more. Habitat for Humanity, food packing, and student trips to serve in distant places are also part of our outreach.

Over 30 ULC connected meetings include many Bible study groups, Prayers and Squares and Tight Knit (both attracting non-members, and what they make mainly goes to non-members), and Music Camp for kids (mostly nonmembers attend). We welcome all to our services and activities, inviting students from other countries to consider us their family in America. They enrich us with their faith.

Ironically, the most pressing reason to build the Harrison Road church is now underused, namely the nave. Only occasionally at some weddings, funerals, or special concerts is our nave filled. Former member Carl Frost wrote, regarding the most important issues facing ULC, "We need enough vision to recognize the needs of the church and enough concern to do something about them." One such need is paying off our mortgage, for which we pay \$75,500 each year. That limits new ways to proclaim God's word. It is a challenge for us all! More about debt retirement will be in the next Lux.


