In preparing for a planning session to consider what God may be inviting us to do next, Imam Chaudhry wrote the following:

Dear friends! I would like to thank you for a fabulous event on Dec. 1st. I think we ended up achieving a lot and the turnout was more than decent. I think it is important to take this further and continue providing such discussions and avenues to our communities [members of ULC and the Islamic Center] where they can interact with each other and we can strengthen our communities.

After a chance encounter with Pastor Ruth Fortis, the Pastor to the Community, I was invited to participate in the three-week summer program, Summer Seminary Sampler. That experience served as the foundation when I was discerning enrollment. Because of the relationships, positive

Food Movers 2017 Schedule



The distribution dates for 2017 are the following: Jan. 26, Feb. 23, Mar. 23, Apr. 27, June 22, July 27, Aug. 24, Sept. 28, Oct. 26, Nov. 16, and Dec. 21. The distribution of food is from 4:30-5:30 p.m. Individuals receiving food must bring their

own boxes or bags for collecting the food.

Recipients are allowed to enter the building at 3:30 p.m. to receive a number. We begin registration shortly after 3:30 when we call people forward to the registration table according to their number. Food distribution by

number begins at 4:30. If a second distribution is desired, a new number should be taken. Second distributions begin at 5:45 if there is food remaining.

Our distribution serves residents of East Lansing, Okemos, and Haslett as well as MSU employees and students. There is no income requirement for this distribution. Individuals must show a picture ID and an additional piece of mail with a matching address within East Lansing, Okemos, or Haslett. MSU employees and students may live outside our serving area but must also show a MSU ID.

ELCA Church Council Approves Strategic Directions Plan

The ELCA Church Council, which serves as the Board of Directors, adopted *Called Forward Together in Christ – ELCA Strategic Directions* 2025. The document provides a framework for shared leadership across the ELCA to realize common goals and better meet challenges the church may face in the future. The Called Forward plan is the result of a process that invited the 3.7 million

members of the church into conversations to provide ideas and feedback about the future of the church.

Related to the issues of leadership and faith formation, Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton announced a \$3 million gift to the ELCA Fund for Leaders, which will provide full tuition seminary scholarships for 60 additional students over the next three years. The scholarships will be awarded through the ELCA Fund for Leaders, an initiative to build an endowed scholarship resource to provide tuition assistance for qualified candidates studying at ELCA seminaries.

Annual Meeting Recap and Thank You to Retiring Council Members

The ULC Annual Meeting was held on the snowy Sunday of Dec. 11. While the expectation of eight inches of snow kept a few members away, more than 65 members met in the Fellowship Hall following a light lunch and snacks for the Annual Meeting.

Keith Harder, Chair of the Members in Ministry Committee presented the ballot. The following individuals were elected:

ULC Treasurer Mike Lenkowski presented the proposed 2017 Budget. He noted that the budget was basically a continuation of the 2016 Budget. Mike emphasized the importance of members pledging for 2017 and reported that 2016 is expected to be break even if members fulfill their pledge commitments for the year. If the pledges are not completed, we will end the year in a deficit.

The 2017 budget included a "challenge amount" of \$27,000. The ULC Council proposed budget included

funding for a new lead pastor from July through December. Council was comfortable in proposing the challenge budget for approval because so many issues remain unknown for 2017. Council will be monitoring both the income and expenses as the year progresses and will make changes as necessary.

We also took time to discuss the \$89,000 unrestricted gift that Marilyn Pierce left to ULC. Marilyn was active in ULC's music program and is remembered for her love of students. Council is planning to honor Marilyn for her love of ULC and is currently discussing a number of possibilities for how the funds should be spent. Council intends to make decisions related to the gift in early 2017.

Lastly, I want to thank the members that will be retiring from Council. These individuals gave of their personal time each month (and more) to help make decisions in the best interest of ULC. The individuals leaving Council include: Mike Lenkowski as Treasurer; Terri Christian as Secretary; Keith Harder as Past-President; Elizabeth Althouse as student member; and Coreen William as member-at-large.

congregation and of naming the

mission priorities that hold the most

promise for continued development of our ministry. Then in the afternoon, the Council will spend

some time visioning what the upcoming year looks like.

Change typically excites me, and I am excited about 2017 at ULC. I believe that God has good things in store for us. I trust that he will use ULC for his purpose and that he will guide us if

we are open to him. I ask for your continued prayers for our congregation and particularly for the leadership at ULC as we move intentionally through 2017.

Security at the Mosque

The ULC Security Team met recently with two members from the mosque. They shared how security at the mosque has evolved over the years. For instance, the front doors of the building faced Harrison Road and were never locked. Today the main entrance is located on the side of the building and the doors are locked overnight.

The mosque is a busy place with a school and people coming for prayer five times a day. A security guard keeps watch on the building and the parking lot. A security company was hired to install cameras, motion detectors and other equipment. The white fence around



the playground area was built so children could play without being visible from Harrison Road.

While the security needs of ULC differ from the mosque in several ways, we can learn from the process that the mosque went through to arrive at their current security status. The ULC Security Team has begun to look at the threats that we need to address and taken a research approach

involving experts, websites and other resources. One security company has visited ULC and another company will be coming in the near future to give us suggestions and an estimate for the cost to install and maintain any equipment that is needed.


