This love shows in your frequent smiles, sometimes restrained, sometimes exuberant. Your love often leads to laughter, uniquely modulated in each person from *pianissimo* to *fortissimo*, to varied expressions of joy rising from hearts being set free from excessive burdens. This love is infectious: smiles born of love beget smiles. This light-heartedness is a chief gift you will give to the newly-called lead pastor.

But authentic love and lightheartedness has always had in the Christian life a companion called suffering. I have met none of you who has not experienced suffering. Luther wrote that suffering is surely not something we pray for, but is part of our journey in and with Christ. He speaks of Christians enduring all kinds of trials accompanied by "inward sadness, timidity, fear, outward poverty, contempt, illness, and weakness, in order to become like their head, Christ."

I have witnessed this in your laments, your expressions of sadness for loved ones lost, for broken people you know you cannot "fix," for our world so lacking in mutual respect and understanding. I have heard your fears for the long-term viability of ULC. Though we may be tempted to suppress our laments as if they were indicators of unfaithfulness, we need to remember they are, in fact, part of a faithful journey together. They need to be expressed in our

conversations with one another and in prayer with our Lord, so that they can become part of our deepening maturity and hope in Christ.

I write this on a day when we are interviewing our first candidate to succeed Amanda as Administrative Assistant and when the Call Committee is having a face to face interview with a prospective lead pastor. This journey together is seldom, if ever, boring! But today is of course, another day of grace, another day when the Spirit will be there to guide us in a place where love, light-heartedness, and yes, lament, are all gifts so richly given to this congregation.

Wietzke: Campus Ministry Beneficial in Two Directions



Pastor Walter Wietzke was the administrative pastor in charge from November 1962 until April 1972. In March 1967 the Towne Courier published

an article titled, "University-Church Relationship Conditions Pastor's Philosophy." Following is an excerpt from that article.

"Students who attend the University Lutheran Church in East Lansing find they are very much a part of the permanent resident congregation.

They are not placed in a separate 'student ministry' but participate in the regular church life to the extent that they hold one-third of the offices in the congregation and have an

effective voice in the conduct of its affairs. Pastor Walter Wietzke regards this integration as highly desirable.

'It is beneficial in two directions,' he said. 'On the one hand, it keeps the life of the parish fresh with the stimuli of ideas from the students.

On the other hand, the traditional parish adds stability and historical continuity to the life of the students. It tends to temper the cynicism which is often common, and it develops better church leaders than might emerge from an isolated student program.""

He ends the article by talking about the church's stand on social problems. He says, "A church is not being a church if it is afraid to step

on toes. It must be obedient to its Lord first of all."

"The University Lutheran Church has taken a very forthright stand on the matter of civil rights in East Lansing, he pointed out. It has stated its position to the city council, its people have functioned individually in areas of human relations, and it has tried to keep alive a consciousness of the necessity for fair treatment of all people."


"The church is a body of believers," he said. "Its witness must be made not only within its own walls but elsewhere in the world. If Christians do not do this, it is a betraval of faith."



Adding Solar to the Mix?

University Lutheran Church has been working faithfully to fulfill our mission to "Practice Stewardship of God's Creation." Since 2010, we have been moving purposefully toward energy conservation and sustainability with our HVAC and lighting upgrades, purchase of eco-friendly supplies and recycling efforts.



through Michigan Interfaith Power and Light to become a participant in a shared solar energy project. This would be a pilot project, the first in Michigan, involving several houses of worship combining to produce enough solar energy to generate about 25-30 percent of electricity needs. The proposed project would be a 20kw netmetered system on our property with the net metering credits coming directly from Consumers Energy to our energy bill, which would be expected to be reduced by several thousand dollars the first year.



Houses of worship around the country have been investing in clean energy as an expression of faith. Locally, Haslett Community Church and Edgewood United Church in East Lansing have installed solar arrays to reduce their environmental footprints and save monetary resources for infusing their

ministry goals.

Our ULC leaders are presently gathering information and investigating the opportunities for our congregation to participate with our Methodist and Islamic neighbors in such a project.

Could this be a new opportunity for ULC to express our religious faith and witness to earthkeeping in a visible way?

Habitat for Humanity

Habitat for Humanity is a worldwide nonprofit organization founded on

the premise that everyone deserves a decent place to live. The local Capitol Region chapter is currently celebrating its 30th year of existence. It has programs for affordable home ownership, home repair,

and wheelchair ramp construction. ULC has a rich history of partnering with Habitat by supplying volunteers and funds for rehabbing homes and building brand new ones.

Barb Kissling and Jane Braatz have coordinated ULC's

participation with Habitat in the past. The local Habitat chapter has a lot planned for this coming year. They have 89 projects planned with 50 home repairs, 30 wheelchair ramps, four new homes, and

two rehab homes. The homes built are not free to the new owners as they make affordable monthly mortgage payments and put in many hours of sweat equity on their own home or on other Habitat homes. St. Paul Lutheran Food Pantry

The July outreach will support the food pantry organized by our friends and neighbors at St. Paul Lutheran Church

on Lake Lansing Road, East Lansing. The pantry is located in a building just west of their church parking lot and is open on Thursday afternoons each week, and twice a month on Tuesday evenings.

There are three ways we can help them this month. First is to give money through the Outreach of the Month program. 
One more thing, St. Paul pantry can always use some volunteer help. (They are looking for some men to help, and I do not know how much strength is needed.)

From the President

Beginnings and Endings

To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven. Ecclesiastes 3:1

As I write this update, I am at the Synod Assembly. My husband Michael, Pastors John and Sara, and I left from the Worship and Music round table discussions at ULC on Sunday, May 21 to meet with other congregations from the North/West Lower Michigan Synod in Mount Pleasant. Michael has written an article on the Synod Assembly (See page 10), so I will provide information here about the round table discussions and the Call Process.

Worship and Music Round Table Discussions: On Sunday, May 21, after a wonderful service led by and celebrating the youth of the congregation, over 50 ULC members enjoyed a potluck and then listened to each other talk about the worship and music at ULC. Each of us was given a paper with four questions:

- 1. What is my vision of worship and music for ULC?
- 2. Our world is changing and so, of course, our congregation is too. What does that mean for our worship and music ministry?
- 3. What styles and/or formats of worship and music have you found to be most welcoming and inclusive?
- 4. Do you feel this is the appropriate time to engage in a capital campaign to fund the renovation of our organ? [and accelerate the retirement of our mortgage]?

We had the opportunity to share our thoughts on each question and listened to the comments of 4-5 other people seated at our table. Thank you to all who participated. It was evident that we care deeply about worship -- not just our own experience, but we also recognize that worship is centered on God and that others may experience worship

differently than we do. Everyone was encouraged to note their comments on the paper, which Council collected and will compile and consider in determining our next steps.

Lead Pastor Call Process: The call process continues to move forward. In mid-May, the Call Committee held inperson interviews of three candidates in three days. It was a marathon, and the Call Committee deserves many

thanks for their dedication! The committee has plans to meet before the end of May to determine whether they are ready to recommend the name of a candidate for ULC to consider as lead pastor. If the committee does forward a name to Council, I will call a special meeting of Council to accept the name for consideration and set

the date for a congregational meeting. At that meeting, the congregation will vote on calling the candidate as lead pastor and the compensation package.

Over the past several months, Pastor John has served as our interim lead pastor. His contract with us ends on June 18. Pastor John has been a stable and encouraging presence during our time of transition. He has led by example. We love him and can tell that he loves us. Since we are still in the midst of the call process, I will ask Council at our June meeting to consider a short extension of our contract with Pastor John.

The season at ULC is changing. We look eagerly toward the future and the good things that God is preparing for us!

The following items were discussed at the May 16 meeting of Council:

- Received the Miyares Family
 (John and Delphina, along with children Xander, Delphina,
 Maristella, and Solana) into membership by letter of transfer from Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church
- Received Mary Margaret Foley into membership by letter of transfer from Messiah Evangelical Lutheran Church
- Received an update from Pastor John on the potential solar garden (with ULC, the Islamic Center and University Methodist Church). The site and purchase/ maintenance details are currently being drafted. More information is expected at the June Council meeting.
- The Synod New and Renewing Mission Table met in early May and increased the ULC Campus Ministry grant by \$4000 for 2017. Beginning in May our monthly increase will be \$450. This reflects the ELCA Campus



Ministry supplemental grant and will put us within \$500 of the level budgeted.

- Pastor John reminded Council that there is a Calendar Planning session scheduled for June 11 after the church service. Anyone interested in attending is welcome to participate in coordinating events.
- Regarding the Pierce Bequest, Council voted to deviate from the ULC Financial Policies for Gift Acceptance Guidelines that identify giving 10 percent of non-designated gifts to the ULC Endowment Fund.
- Due to the impending transfers of the current Stewardship Team, Members in Ministry is tasked with identifying members for this essential team.
- Larry Wagenknecht reported that the Team to fill the

- Administrative Assistant position will start conducting interviews in the next few days.
- Pastor Sara C. reported that Visas have been secured by four people from the Honduras Synod. Plans continue for their visit to the Lansing area in August. They will have use of the ULC van for transportation.
- The Call Committee is conducting in person interviews of three candidates for Lead Pastor this week. More information will be shared as progress is made.
- Finalized questions to be used during the "round table" discussion and potluck on Sunday, May 21 from 11 a.m.-1 p.m. to give the congregation an opportunity to learn about the challenges and opportunities associated with the pipe organ and discuss how this fits in with what God is calling us to be.

Notes from the May 3 meeting:

Outreach (Bryan Rahe): Food distribution served 43 households in April (down from approximately 70). The Lenten collection, "Change for Change," collected approximately \$1,200 (down from \$1,700 last year)

Resource (Ann Booren): Stewardship Team needs to replace Keith Harder. Dehumidifier installed in basement. Styrofoam cup supply winding down.

2017 Synod Assembly

Thank you from Vicki and me to ULC for the privilege of attending the Northwest Lower Michigan Synod Assembly, held at Mt. Pleasant May 21-23. As a retired ELCA pastor who has served in Michigan since 1970, the "Synod" takes on special meaning. In the closing worship, Bishop Satterlee preached that we are all in this together. To me this means the N/WLM Synod is as important as our ULC congregation. Bishop Satterlee urged us to reach out to our neighbors and do the Lord's work together. It is not our church, it is God's church and we serve God through the congregation, the synod and the ELCA.

Whenever the Synod Assembly meets, the worship is full of energy, meaning, and loud, strong singing. We celebrated Holy Communion three times. The opening service was held at Immanuel Lutheran Church on Sunday evening. On Monday

morning we worshiped again with Holy Communion. Our sending service was the service where the Bishop presided and preached. By the way, do you know that this man because of his eyesight does almost everything from memory?

There were also great speakers. Bishop R. Guy Erwin, from the Southwest California Synod spoke twice. His first effort was a sermon preached on the meaning of the 500th Anniversary of the beginning of the Reformation. He asked the question, "What does this all mean for us today?" His second address was about the "tribes" to whom we belong. Bishop Irwin is a "full blooded" Native American. He was born in Oklahoma and became a Lutheran at Harvard University. One interesting fact about his baptism was that Bishop Eaton was an intern pastor when he was baptized.

Prairie Rose Seminole, another Native American was our ELCA representative who spoke about the current churchwide work of the ELCA. Pastor Ken Ponds spoke about an invitation to come to ULC on June 17 for Lutherans Always Reforming, a day of Social Change Conversation. Dr. Craig Nessan will be the speaker. The main reason I love going to the Synod Assembly is the people. I bring greetings to you from Pastor Chrisy Bright and retired Pastor Reed Schroer. The daughter of a Lutheran pastor, after marriage John and Delphina discovered his father attended a Bible study at her father's church over thirty years earlier. Delphina has published a number of novels, some under pen names, for the late teen and college age. They feature imaginative creatures like unicorns and dragons.

Son Xander, 10, is interested in music and beams with delight when serving as acolyte. Delphina (Dee Dee), eight, has already written and published her first children's book – "Mermaids can Ride Bicycles." Maristella, six, is a voracious reader. Solana, three, is like her name, sunshine in their lives.

What drew them to ULC? The traditional service, which they and their children immediately appreciated, and the liberal, inclusive atmosphere of our church. What an addition they make in our midst!
