From the Pastor's Pen . . .

Lent Begins Feb. 14th

Lent begins this year on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 14. It seems that the Christmas season has barely ended and we are already moving into the season of Lent!

During the call process, the congregation and Council identified a desire for the congregation to grow in its spirituality and faith. With that in mind, as a way to

deepen our spirituality and faith, and to become more fluent in sharing our faith, we have shaped the Lenten season around the theme, *Sharing Faith Stories*. This will happen is two significant ways.

First, we are putting together a Lenten devotional booklet to be used in the congregation throughout the season of Lent. The booklet will contain 40 devotions written by members and staff of ULC. In the devotions, each person will share a favorite biblical passage, why it is important to them, and in the

process, they will share some of their faith story.

Second, six individuals will be sharing their faith story in worship on Wednesdays during Lent at both the noon and 7 p.m. service. I will

begin on Ash Wednesday and then Pastor Haley Vay and four others from the congregation will share their story on the other Wednesdays.

Our hope in doing this is that it will get us all thinking about our faith and our faith story, and help us to articulate and share it. We also hope that this booklet will help people in the congregation to set aside some time each day during Lent for prayer, devotions, and deepening their faith, as well as getting to know each other better and in a deeper way.

What I've found in doing this in the past and am finding again this year, is that people are interested in reading other people's devotions and hearing what their faith means to them, but hesitant about writing their

own devotion and sharing their own faith. Interesting..... a growth area for our faith/spirituality..... how to share what is deeply meaningful and personal. I really look forward to reading these devotions. In fact, as I'm beginning to receive devotions from people, they are pretty powerful. I think this will be a real blessing to us.

As we continue through the cold winter month of February, I pray that God's Spirit will continue to warm you with its presence and power, and that this Lenten season will be a time to grow in your faith.



Organ Renovation is Beginning

So, what is an eight-foot Gamba? Or an eight-foot

Salacinol? Those are just two of the new sets of pipes coming soon to ULC's organ!

With the congregation's generous support, we have raised just about all of the funds needed for our organ repair and renovation project. Work has begun in the shop of the Fowler-Hebert Organ Company and will continue there until just after Easter.

In April, we look forward to work beginning in our sanctuary. Each week will bring different stages of construction.

You may arrive for church one week and find the inner workings of the organ case exposed and gutted. Another week, you may see gleaming new pipes laid out across of the floor as they are prepared to be installed. And by September, the recycled, the old, and the new parts will all combine to create the pipe organ that can last into the next century.

In the end, we will have a new blower and wind chests to provide a steady stream of air through the pipes. We will have a brand-new console, with two manuals (keyboards) and a full pedal board and the ability to control dynamics with swell shutters. And we will have a lot of new pipes! Most importantly, we will have an organ that:

- Actually works no dead notes, no parts that can't be replaced or repaired, is suited for the size of our sanctuary
- Can more suitably lead our current worship services
- Is better able to accompany our choirs, instrumentalists, and soloists
- Will be capable of performing a much larger body of organ literature
- Will be able to better work with new and varied worship forms
- Can make ULC an even more attractive venue for university and community music performances
- Will attract members who love and value Lutheran liturgical worship

If you have any questions, stop at the organ after either service on Feb. 4. Kristie and I will be there to answer any questions about the current organ or the renovation.

Each week, we lift our praises to God through our music. Our souls are stirred and our spirits are lifted by the music that sings of our faith. Thanks be to God!

February Outreach of the Month

Food Packing

Likely, either you or someone you know at ULC has volunteered for

one of the "God's Work, Our Hands" food packing events. In 2015, we packaged over 10,000 dehydrated meals and in both 2016 and 2017, we packaged over 14,000 meals! We have teamed with the Islamic Center each year and plans are underway to hold another food packing event in 2018.

Where do you fit in? We need lots of volunteers to pack the food – and that's the fun part. We also need to buy the dehydrated food to package. The food only costs 28 cents per

meal. Each packing event consists of a minimum of 10,000 meals, so the

minimum total cost is \$2,800. In 2015, the Youth Ministry fund primarily paid for the food supplies. In 2016, ULC's Endowment fund paid for half of the cost and the Islamic Center funded the other half. In 2017, ULC members contributed \$2,017 through an Outreach of

the Month and the Islamic Center contributed \$1,400! The Islamic Center is interested in partnering again with us in 2018.

We need your help to reach the goal of \$2,018. February's Outreach of

the Month is the 2018 Food Packing event. You can help feed hungry people in East Lansing (one-third of the meals were given to the MSU Student Food Bank in 2016 & 2017) and around the world by donating. Make checks out to "ULC" with Food Packing on the memo line or use envelopes in the backs of the pews to donate cash – just write "Food Packing" on the outside of the envelope and place it in the offering plate.

Oh, and one more opportunity! If you are interested in helping plan the event, please talk with me. This is a great opportunity to spend time getting to know members of the Islamic Center and the Imam.

Retreat to Focus on Campus Ministry

"Commit your work to the Lord and your plans will be established." Proverbs 16:3 (RSV)

On Saturday, Feb. 3 the ULC Council will participate in a retreat to discern questions related to campus ministry and calling an associate pastor. This retreat is timely as we prepare for our Feb. 22 visioning meeting with synod representatives (including Bishop Craig Satterlee) and Episcopalian representatives (including Bishop Wendell Gibbs) to discuss ULC's campus ministry partnership with Canterbury House.

Since its inception, ULC has engaged in a strong and lasting commitment to campus ministry. That commitment is a vital part of ULC's ministry and remains steady. In looking to the future, Council will discuss the leadership of our campus ministry program both in terms of the position (i.e., Associate Pastor) and the person who will best fill that position. The following excerpt from the ELCA Statement on Campus Ministry will help guide that discussion:

"Drawing on the Scriptures and the Lutheran Confessions, campus ministry bears witness to God's amazing grace within the context of higher education. Sensitive to pastoral needs of those on campus and engaged in the intellectual discourse of the university, campus ministry strives to communicate the gospel in fresh ways."

Proverbs reminds us that faith and planning are not antithetical. For over seven decades, ULC has committed its work to the Lord through campus ministry. That work and commitment continue as we plan for the future.

Video Surveillance Update

In 2016 the ULC Church Council created the Security Team. After extensive research with other churches, businesses, conferences, online resources, law enforcement personnel and security companies, the team decided acquiring surveillance cameras was a priority.

A camera system and three cameras (front doors, narthex, and lower level at the bottom of the stairs) were financed with funds from the Marilyn Pierce bequest and installed in January, 2017. A monitor showing footage from the three cameras is located on the administrative assistant's desk. When motion activated, the system records what is viewed and can be accessed at a later time.

The cameras were helpful in several ways last year. A few months ago several prayer quilts were missing from a bin in the narthex. Camera recordings showed a homeless person removing them from the bin. More recently, the

church front doors were unlocked overnight. The recordings indicated that a new custodian was the last person to leave the building. Action was taken to address both situations.

The Security Team received a grant from the Endowment Committee at the end of 2017 to purchase three more cameras. Since the team has no line item in the budget, we owe a big "thank you" to this committee for funding the purchase. In January these cameras were placed in the

office hallway, nursery and Sunday School hallway. Protecting our children is a priority for the team.

You may not have noticed the cameras around the church, but you probably did see the video surveillance signs on the ULC front doors. Law enforcement officials feel these signs alone are a deterrent to criminal activity. We hope this is true for ULC too!

New ULC Website Coming Soon!

In Sept. 2017 a task force was created to review how ULC communicates to members as well as how we reach out to the community. Other members will be invited to join it to work on specific projects.

Updating the ULC website was identified as a top priority and a new design has been developed. In addition to a website that will now be fully functional on all platforms (including smart phones and tablets), the new site will be more welcoming to visitors and more easily managed by office staff. We have updated information, reorganized some categories and added lots of pictures. (Note: If you do not want your photo to appear on the ULC website, please

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fill out a "Photo Denial" form in the office.)

We have also excluded the "Members Only" section that requires a log-in. Forms frequently used by members and visitors will now be found on the new site under the "Resources" tab.

The member directory, council minutes, etc. will not be included on the website. Access to these documents will soon be made available through a special members log-in to our new "Realm" membership software program. By making this change, this information will be

more easily uploaded by staff and hopefully kept more current and secure.

Once the new website goes "live" (hopefully by Ash Wednesday), the information and forms on the current website will no longer be available. Our web address, www.ulcel.org will remain the same, but it will redirect to the new site. While we load documents onto Realm, "Members Only" documents will be available in the ULC office. We apologize for any inconvenience!
