Haley Vay Beaman Called to ULC

On an icy Sunday, Apr. 15th, ULC members unanimously voted to call Haley Vay Beaman to serve as a full-time associate pastor. Pastor Haley Vay has served as a part-time interim campus pastor at ULC since Aug. 2017. In her new role, she will continue to lead the One Community campus ministry program as well lead Lifelong Faith Formation ministry with a emphasis on youth and family faith formation.

Pastor Haley Vay will be installed at the 10:45 a.m. worship service on Sunday, May 13. The gospel style service will express the theme of the day through special music, including liturgical dance, Young Adult and Senior Choirs, soloists and instrumentalists. Bishop Craig A. Satterlee will be preaching. A reception will follow.

What's the Holy Spirit up to at ULC?

With May, we come to the end of the academic year, Alpha Sunday, Affirmation of Baptism Sunday, Synod Assembly and Pentecost Sunday with the outpouring of the Spirit. Lent and Easter is past, and it's generally the end of the church program year. And usually I get to this point in the year, let out a big breath, feel good about what's been accomplished and look forward to the summer. But this year feels different. Sure I have the usual feelings, but this time, this time of year feels more like a beginning than an ending.

Through the interview and call process, one of the big "tasks" that was discussed and that lay ahead, was developing and completing our staffing model. With the call of Pastor Haley Vay now official, and her installation as Associate Pastor coming up this month, our staff is complete, and we're ready to go. As a result, that's why it feels like we're just beginning instead of winding things up for the year.

During my call process, when I finally said "yes" to interviewing here at ULC and being open to the Holy Spirit's direction, I felt very strongly that the Holy Spirit was at work, leading and directing me, and leading and directing the Call Committee and congregation. I've also felt the Spirit's direction as I've gotten to know Pastor Haley Vay, as we've worked together these past five months, and as we've moved through her call process.



With the new staff we now have in place, including Britny Pollard as Administrative Assistant, and Janine Novenske Smith in her new role as Director of Music, in addition to Pastor Haley Vay, myself and the existing staff that continues on, I have a strong sense that the Holy Spirit has been at work to bring us all together.

So, here's the question now that we're all here and in place.... What's the Holy Spirit up to here at ULC? What new directions might the Holy Spirit lead us in? What new ventures might the Spirit take us on that we never imagined? What new ministries might the Spirit lead us into? What does the Holy Spirit have in store for us?

As we celebrate Pentecost and the outpouring of the Spirit on the Church later this month, I think about the surprising new directions and ministries into which the Spirit led the early Church, and I wonder and get excited about what that might mean for us.

So no, the end of the program year isn't an ending this year. It's a beginning! It's the beginning of a new chapter in the ministry of ULC, building on the past and moving forward into a future led by the Spirit. And I'm excited to see where the Spirit might lead!

Change is situational; situations arrive that change the congregation. Change is neutral. New beginnings are carefully designed and planned and well nurtured.

Add "My Beloved World" to Your Reading List

The City of East Lansing and Michigan State University announce the book selection for the 2018 One Book, One Community program: "My Beloved World," a memoir by Associate Justice Sonia Sotomayor, Supreme Court of the United States.

Sotomayor's story is one of determination and the hope, tenacity, hard work and self-reliance that would propel a little girl who grew up in a Puerto Rican corner of the Bronx to the highest court in the land. In "My Beloved World," Sotomayor provides readers with a frank and loving account of her coming of age and her large extended family, many with roots still in Puerto



Rico. Sotomayor also recounts the adversity she has faced in her life – from growing up in poverty with an at-times challenging family life to her lifelong management of juvenile diabetes and her determination to adapt to a wider world that would eventually result in her becoming the first Latina and third woman appointed to the U.S. Supreme Court.

This is our summer selection, but Book Club will not meet again until October. (No book club meetings in May-Sept.)

Faith Through Design

A while ago a statement of the architect, Dan Toshach, was quoted in Lux describing the design of the sanctuary of ULC. In part he said, "The choice of materials, wood and concrete, was made in order to express the natural materials of God's world, and their form and finish express the great strength of the Christian faith as expressed in the Lutheran service."

Recently, a Lux article was found that explained other design features in the sanctuary and their purpose:

- Pastor Wietzke suggested the hanging cross to support Luther's assertion that "Everything in Christian life is under the cross."
- The north side of the sanctuary has more windows of lighter colors to allow in more light; the south side of the sanctuary has fewer windows of darker colors to block some of the heat.
- A table altar, rather than a tomb altar was selected to stress the fellowship of communion.
- The baptismal font is attached to (but not part of) the altar and is of a lower level to represent entry into faith. The baptismal bowl is an original design and gift from the artist. When water is added, the thick glass in the center creates the illusion of great deepness.

- The communion rail was designed so that participants completely surrounded the altar. This was not the usual arrangement in Lutheran churches at that time and strengthens the sense of communion with one another as well as with God.
- Pastors Wietzke and Gaiser requested more space between the altar and the communion rail to allow for more lay participation in serving communion.
- The pulpit was raised and surrounded by wood to further emphasize the upward sweep of the sanctuary at that point and to reinforce the importance of the Word in the life of the Church.

The article went on to say, "The lighting which creates the "three cross shadow" was not in the original design but was noted when the lights were adjusted on the cross and kept as an important symbol."

The original article, "Our Building: Faith through Design," appeared in the Feb. 2004 Lux and was written by Amy Wagenknecht using information presented during a forum by Phyllis Andersland.

Something to Consider

Why Do We Need a Large Church Building?

That's a question some people may ponder when budget time comes. Three reasons - First, our church building with its unique architecture, prominent cross, and well-kept grounds has brought people to worship. Here they find welcome and a choice of two services, with educational opportunities for all ages in between. PEOPLE make the church, but there has to be a place to meet.

Secondly, as part of our outreach, ULC has long invited outside groups to use our facilities free of charge. Perhaps the first was the Latvian church, still holding monthly services Sunday afternoons. In thanks, they gave us an oil painting, hanging in the administrative wing. CVIP (Community Volunteers for International Programs), ISM (International Student Ministry Board), and Friendship House classes - English Grammar,

Watercolor, and American Nations - are held here. Enhance Fitness, a YMCA exercise program for older people, meets three times weekly.

FAN (Families Against Narcotics), has 70 - 140 attending monthly. Their president told Sunday Forum he appreciated former Pastor Fred's welcome, away from downtown

where drug dealers lurk. Support groups such as Friends of Bill W. (Alcoholics Anonymous), Back Porch Group, Narcotics Anonymous Steps to Serenity and Food Addicts Anonymous all meet here. Other groups include Lansing Meditation, the Michigan Parkinson's Foundation, Arts Chorale of Greater Lansing, Samaritas, Q-Cross (LGBT), Red Cedar Community Association, Sons of Norway (ULC member Gary Lee, president), Habitat Young Professionals, and Mid-Michigan Land Conservancy.

Third, we have space for special festive meals in Fellowship Hall as well as an auditorium for major events and concerts open to all. The Episcopalian Phyllis Tickle, featured in six Sunday Forums by Pastor Gary, predicted the future church would be a small number of people gathering in house churches. But we have that too, as people form close friendships through Bible study, varied activities, as well as planning for and accomplishing the work of our congregation - all held in our church.



Some of ULC's groups include Tuesday Morning Bible Study, Amnos, Lychnion, and Rhodon Bible Study Circles, and Lectio Divina. Service and Fellowship activities include Prayers & Squares, Tight Knit, MSU Retirees Quilt/Sew, Book Club, Aces and Spaces (Bridge), Fridays at Five (Campus Ministry), Senior Choir, and Handbells. Many committees and teams meet here: Archives, Call Committee, Campus Ministry, Church Council, Communications, Earthkeeping, Endowment, Evangelism, Facilities, Finance, Lead Management, Library, Membership, Security, Staff, and Worship Planning - all necessary, but also small groups.

With a geographically widespread congregation, our building provides the center to worship, to do, and to meet, appreciate, and really care about one another. We aren't just a Sunday church!

remain on the bulletin board next to the sanctuary, and it will be updated weekly by volunteer staff.

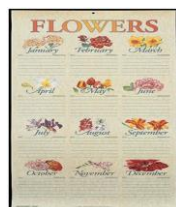

We both also attended "Growing Spiritually as a Congregation Council" a workshop on faith formation and provided lots of resources for study and discussion. The key role of congregational leaders is first and foremost to be spiritual people, committed to their faith in Christ, eager to continue growing in their personal spiritual formation and anxious to assist others in their growth. Leaders should have a desire to contribute their gifts which all build the community of spiritual formation.

I attended a workshop on "Dealing with 'isms (racism, sexism, and ageism) in your Congregation." We drew a picture of a typical Lutheran congregation – white, male dominated, culturally not diverse and heavily influenced by our European worship traditions and how we deal with our definition of blessings and privilege.

Carol attended "A Look Ahead at the 2018 Synod Assembly." This was a very informative session lead by Sandy Schlesinger. She not only spoke about some of the issues to be

discussed and voted on at the next Synod Assembly, but also gave a very helpful explanation of how the synod is organized and how it functions.

The day was concluded with a Eucharist service. Bishop Satterlee gave a wonderful sermon on shepherding.

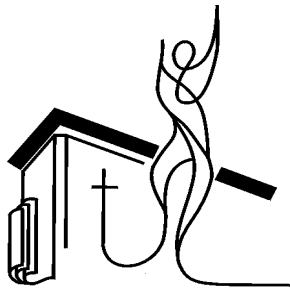
