Pastor John will be our preacher at ULC a final time on Sunday, Nov. 5 during the single service at 10:45 a.m. Following worship, his ministry

But somehow God broke through my resistance and surprised me with a new call and a new direction for my life and ministry.

Thank you for calling me to be your new lead pastor. I'm surprised, humbled, and excited by the opportunity to serve as your pastor.

together in supporting this exciting ministry with our time, talents and pledges in 2018. God bless you.



The next meeting of the ULC Book Club will be on **Thursday**, **Nov. 30** at 10 a.m.

The book to be discussed in November is *News of the World* by Paulette Jiles. From the publisher: "It is 1870 and Captain Jefferson Kyle Kidd travels

through northern Texas giving live readings to paying audiences hungry for news of the world. In Wichita Falls, he is offered a \$50 gold piece to deliver a young orphan to her relatives in San Antonio. The 400 mile journey south through unsettled territory and unforgiving terrain proves difficult.

On arrival, the reunion is neither happy nor welcome. Captain Kidd is faced with a terrible choice: abandon the girl to her fate or become-in the eyes of the law-a kidnapper himself. Exquisitely rendered and morally complex this is a brilliant work of historical fiction that explores the boundaries of family, responsibility, honor and trust." All are welcome.

Two New Books, Recommended by You!

The ULC Library committee has added three new items to the

collection – all were recommended by members of the congregation. *Dear Pope Francis* is written for children but all ages could benefit by reading this book. *The Book of Joy* was recommended by Pastor Sarah M., and we purchased this book in two formats. We have a traditional hardcover and chose this title for our first book on tape. We are hoping that the book on tape format will be popular, so we ask that you listen to the book and return it to the library in a timely fashion.

In *Dear Pope Francis*, Pope Francis gives children around the world the chance to ask the big questions and celebrates their spiritual depth by directly answering those questions. Some are fun. Some are serious. And some will quietly break your heart. But all of them are from children who deserve to know and feel God's unconditional love. (INT 248.4 Fra) According to *The Book of Joy* book jacket, "Novel Peace Prize Laureates His Holiness the Dalai Lama and Archbishop Desmond Tutu have survived more than fifty years of exile and the soul-crushing violence of oppression. Despite their hardships – or, as they would say, because of them - they are two of the most joyful people on the planet.

In April 2015, Archbishop Tutu traveled to the Dalai Lama's home in India, to celebrate His Holiness's eightieth birthday and to create what they hoped would be a gift for others. They looked back on their lives to answer a question: How do we find joy in the face of suffering?

By the end of a week filled with laughter and punctuated with tears, these two global heroes had stared into the abyss and despair of our times and revealed how to live a life brimming with joy...

The Archbishop has never claimed sainthood, and the Dalai Lama

considers himself a simple monk. In this unique collaboration, they offer us the reflection of real lives filled with pain and turmoil in the midst of which they have been able to discover a level of peace, of courage, and of joy to which we can all aspire in our own lives." (294.3 Dal & CD Book 294.3)

Earthkeeping News

Energy Savings Continues

Care for the environment has led many Michigan faith communities, including University Lutheran Church, to seek out ways to reduce our carbon footprints. This

includes energy efficiency upgrades to their houses of worship and in some cases, the installation of new sources of clean energy.

Locally, Haslett Community Church and Edgewood United Church have installed rooftop solar arrays as part

of their ongoing effort to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions and care for creation. Nationally, mayors, county officials, governors, major companies and millions of Americans have pledged to stay "all in" when it comes to reaching our nation's goals under the Paris Accord. Globally, more than 1,000 of the world's top companies (NRDC) support the need for a shift away from fossil fuels and toward clean energy innovation, a cleaner, smarter way to power our future.

ULC has continued to reduce the amount of energy we use and has experienced a savings of \$2,000 in utility bills over the past five months compared to a year ago. This monetary savings can now be used to further our mission. The next focus will be on phantom energy use (the electricity drawn from outlets when equipment is off but still plugged in.) These may seem like small measures but over time they add up.

This is part of our faith in action and a testament to our concern for the place we call our home, Earth.

Dear Bobbie and all members of Prayers & Squares:



November Outreach of the Month Greater Lansing Food Bank

The November Outreach of the Month is the Greater Lansing Food Bank (GLFB). This organization provides food to people in need in seven central Michigan counties -Clinton, Eaton, Ingham, Clare, Isabella, Gratiot, and Shiawassee Counties. Last year almost eight million pounds of food was distributed. The GLFB has several programs to accomplish their goals such as the Garden Project which provides individuals with the knowledge, supplies, and space to grow their own food.

The program we are most familiar with at ULC is the Food Movers



program. This program rescues excess perishable food from local licensed kitchens, grocery stores, and bakeries which is then distributed monthly at various locations around the region. Our Food Movers distribution is held in the Fellowship Hall on the fourth Thursday of every month except November and December when it is held on the third Thursday.

Please consider supporting the Greater Lansing Food Bank as the need for food continues to grow in our community. There are Outreach of the Month envelopes in the pews. Checks should be made out to *ULC* with "GLFB-Outreach of the Month" on the memo line. We also invite you to volunteer to help at our monthly distributions.

A Small Change on the ULC Giving Tree

As many of you know, the Giving Tree during the middle of November through the early weeks of December has been a longstanding tradition at ULC. Tags are removed from the tree, gifts are purchased for the individual listed on the tag, then returned to church and put under the tree. This year we will be making a small change.

The tree will continue to have tags for senior citizens from Tri-County Office on Aging. The tree will not have tags for foster children or young adults.

Instead, there will be tags that will be printed with items needed by a Samaritas refugee young person who will be moving into an apartment of his or her own.

When the refugee youth moves, Samaritas gives each person three boxes. One contains items needed in the



kitchen such as paring knife, cutting board, can opener, oven mitt, etc. Another contains items for the bathroom like towels, shower curtain, toothbrush, deodorant, hand soap, etc. The third contains items needed in the bedroom, for example, sheet set, alarm clock, pillow, etc.

The items will be grouped on the tags so the amount spent is about \$25, which is what has been suggested as a limit in the past. If you have gently used items listed on your tag, those are welcome too. However, please don't bring items that are <u>not</u> on the tags. We won't be able to process them. Hopefully, we'll be able to supply items for four groups of boxes (12 boxes in all) this holiday season.

If you would prefer to purchase for an individual, look for the tags with senior citizen names on them. They also appreciate our generosity. If you would prefer to write a check, be sure to write GIVING TREE on the memo line. Watch for the tree to appear in the narthex by Nov. 12.

ULC Constitution Amendments

The ULC Constitution (C19.04) states: "Whenever the Model Constitution for Congregations is amended by the [ELCA] Churchwide Assembly, this Constitution may be amended to incorporate any such amendment by ... a simple majority vote of those voting members present and voting at any subsequent meeting of the congregation...."

At its Nov. 12 Annual Meeting, the ULC congregation will vote on proposed amendments to the ULC Constitution. Those amendments were approved by Council for a congregational vote and are driven solely by changes to the ELCA Model Constitution for Congregations, which were adopted since 2005 by the ELCA Churchwide Assembly. Many changes involve "word-smithing" to update language and enhance consistency. Other changes are more substantive in nature.

The terminology changes include the use of the phrase "minister/s of Word and Sacrament" instead of "ordained minister/s," "clergy," "pastors," and "associate in ministry, diaconal minister and deaconess." Member classification was changed in 2016 to Section C8.02 of the ELCA Model Constitution. Associate members may no longer vote and the category of seasonal members has been added. This change will affect ULC membership as students typically have been associate members with voting privileges. Students will either have to switch membership from their home church or have the designation of seasonal member to exercise voting privileges.

 - Tim Schmidt received by Affirmation of Baptism
- Received a report on the upcoming plans for Campus Ministry by Pastor Haley Vay Beaman
- Received a report that as of Oct. 18, 2017 a total of \$84,116.30 has been received of the approximately \$127,000 pledge for organ improvements
- Council approved an additional allocation of up to \$25,000 of the



Pearce bequest towards the organ improvements (if needed) to reach the \$187,400 of projected improvements

- Council reviewed the proposed contract for organ improvements, but decided that the contract will not be signed until full funding is achieved
- Received a report on the status of the solar garden. After discussion it was agreed that ULC will not be moving forward on the project at this time. It was noted that the Earthkeeping Team is thanked for their work on this issue and is encouraged on going dialogue to continue exploring solar options
- Council members will be invited to an exit interview with Pastor John Schleicher and the Synod Office
- Approved the proposed 2018 ULC budget pending additional

information gained from pledges submitted by ULC members

- Returned the proposed Weapons on Church Premises Policy to the Security Team for further review
- Reviewed the issues of the revisions to the Constitution and the ULC Budget that will discussed during the Annual Meeting on Nov. 12
- Approved the Lead Pastor position description for Pastor Gary Bunge
- Approved Nov 13, 2017 as the official start date for Pastor Bunge
- Approved Dec 10, 2017 at 3 p.m. as the installation service for Pastor Bunge
- Approved holding a single worship service at 10:45 a.m. for Dec. 10
- Appointed Jeff Andresen, Erin Frisch, Lisa Swem and Bill Trevarthan as members of a Transition Team for Pastor Bunge. The team will be in place for six months.

Another significant change is found in Section C4.03, which deletes subsection (f) which states: "ensure the inclusion and involvement of students in the life, governance, and ministry of ULC; minister in particular to people at Michigan State University and other institutions of higher learning in the greater Lansing area." The proposed deletion of this language is troubling for many, as this language reflects one of the pillars on which ULC was founded. Keep in mind, however, that this language (as well as other proposed deletions) may be placed in the ULC By-laws or Continuing Resolutions.

Vicki Anderson, ULC Congregation President, commented: "Keeping the ULC Constitution consistent with the model ELCA Constitution is essential for two reasons. First, it helps to ensure that we operate in accordance with the wider church. Second, our Constitution must be consistent with the model ELCA Constitution before ULC can make changes specific to our needs. For example, we cannot make changes regarding the number of members on Council or when we hold our Annual Meeting until we bring the ULC Constitution in conformance with the model ELCA Constitution."

Two Forums about the proposed changes were recently conducted — the first one on Oct. 15 addressing the "what" and the second on Oct. 22 addressing the "why." A summary of the proposed changes as well as a "redlined" version of the proposed changes is found on the ULC website.

Lutheran Disaster Response

Lutheran Disaster Response brings God's hope, healing and renewal to people whose live have been disrupted by disasters in the U. S. and around the world. When the dust settles and the headlines change LDR stays to provide ongoing assistance to those in need.

U.S. Wildfires

Massive wildfires fueled by intense winds have destroyed more than 1,000 homes, endangered entire communities, and continue to claim lives in California. More than 100,000 people have been forced to evacuate while thousands of others remain without

power and other utilities. Lutheran Disaster Response, through the Sierra Pacific Synod and Lutheran Social Services of Northern California, will be responding to address the overwhelming needs of those affected by wildfires.

Hurricanes

Harvey: In the midst of a strong local response by individuals and congregations, the groundwork has been laid for the extended long-term recovery work of disaster case management, emotional and spiritual care, volunteer coordination and construction management. Lutheran Disaster Response is working with two of the Texas Synods across the impacted areas of Texas. We anticipate working in the Dickinson and Rockport areas in partnership with Upbring (Lutheran Social Services of the South). With the support of Lutheran Disaster Response, a coordinator will be working to help facilitate volunteers and material donations in the region.

Irma and Maria: Lutheran Disaster Response is working with the Florida-Bahamas Synod, the Caribbean Synod, and other International companions and partners to provide relief to the most vulnerable in the U.S. and around the world. • In Florida, the initial response, in addition to local efforts at clean-up and providing temporary shelter, has focused on crisis counseling to thousands in 20 Florida counties. This work is being done through



our affiliate, Lutheran Services of Florida. Early support has been extended to care providers so that they can be assured their families are in a stable living situation, and are able to turn their attention to the care of the most vulnerable in the community.

• In Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, we're coordinating the delivery of critical

items including dry food, generators, and solarpowered phones. In Haiti, we're supporting woman-headed

- In Haiti, we're supporting woman-headed households and farmers who were affected by the hurricanes.
- In Cuba, we're supporting the distribution of items like cookware, dishes, and blankets to help families get back to normal life.

Remembering Emly Rose Horne (Oct. 1, 1935 - Sept. 14, 2017)



I met our sister in Christ Emly on a July evening in 2013 during a meeting of the committee formed to support our pastoral intern

Asher. She may have been small in stature but her personality filled the room and it immediately became evident that she was passionate about preparing pastoral candidates for ministry. The word passionate is one of many adjectives that apply to Emly. She was also committed, dedicated, hard working, intellectually curious and feisty enough to take on any figure of authority.

Emly was a passionate educator who taught primarily the middle grades in the Lansing Public School district for her entire career. She married Steve Horne, a Trinity Seminary student, who she met during his internship at Bethlehem Lutheran Church, while she was leading VBS one summer. Steve was killed in a car accident shortly before graduation changing the course of Emly's life. A devoted daughter she remained with her parents from that point on seeing her Mom reach the age of 101 before she passed just a few years ago. Throughout her life she also remained committed to Trinity Seminary influencing their Christian education and sacred music curriculum, and to the Old Everett Neighborhood where she grew up.

Emly was also a passionate organizer. It was in this role that she truly shined. She served on many boards and committees, and founded several as well including the Ingham County TRIAD, an organization that paired police with elderly in the community. It was no surprise to me that police chiefs and mayoral candidates attended her funeral service. Emly stayed true to form right to the end vowing to fix the problems she observed in her Assisted Living Community's rules and regulations, and to educate the nurses at the hospital on how to

better communicate with seniors during her final stay there.

The other key role that Emly played was as a devoted Godmother. Her love for and pride in her family came through in every conversation we had. Her godchild Gerald, an ELCA pastor in Midland, stated at her funeral that "she raised up her Godchildren to be more than we could be.....God's children."

You may remember Emly as the tiny, white haired figure in the back pew where she could keep an eye on the choir. Her final years of life were spent defying the life expectancy of stage IV cancer so she was not able to join us for worship as often as she wished. She loved the worship format at ULC and was a strong supporter of the organ restoration project. Emly's love for God and neighbor showed through in all her life's work. That work continues on due to her persistent leadership.
