From the Pastor's Pen

As I've grown as a person of faith throughout my life and ministry, I've come to understand generosity and giving as central to the life of faith. At times I've talked about generosity and giving as a mark of discipleship. At other times I've talked about it as a faith practice.

But either way, giving and generosity

is central to being a follower of Jesus, because giving and generosity is what Jesus was all about: For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich. 2 Corinthians 8:9

This year, we'll focus on generosity and giving in worship during the month of October around the theme: **"What does Jesus say...?"** And each Sunday we'll explore what Jesus says about some aspect of generosity and giving. Here's what we've planned: • Oct. 7 ... About Stewardship? John 13:1-17, 34-35

What Does Jesus Say ...?

- Oct. 14 ... About Worrying About Having Enough? Luke 12:13-34
- Oct. 21 ... About Riches and Possessions? Mark 10:17-31

Oct. 28 ... About Money? Matthew 6:19-21, 24-34



You see, at its heart and core, giving and generosity aren't about giving back to God what God has given to us as if it were our own. The reality is that all that I have is not mine to use as I want. God has created it and owns

And then on Sunday, Oct. 28, we'll bring our Giving Commitment Cards forward during the offering as an act of worship and faith.

As I've been here at ULC for almost a year now, I've seen what a marvelous ministry we have as a congregation and all the lives that we touch in so many different ways. And it is because of your faithful giving and generosity that this ministry happens. Without your generosity, we would have no ministry.

Thank you for your faithful giving, and may God continue to help us grow in this central practice of faith.

Inviting All N/WLM Synod Students

In September, I joined with ELCA campus ministers across our North/West Lower Michigan synod to communicate with all 117 congregations and 220 pastors in our synod's geographic area. Our goal was to cast a net wide, so that every young person who goes to college might be connected with a congregation while in school.



Congregation leaders were encouraged to visit the LuMin website (<u>lumin-</u> <u>networkreferral.org</u>, a database for ELCA campus ministry connections) and submit contact information for their

graduating seniors. These names are then disseminated to local campus congregations who reach out and connect students to their ministries. It's brilliant!

This referral network has allowed us easier access to students who are coming to study at MSU and LCC from ELCA congregations around the entire country. It has opened doors also for us to refer our graduating seniors to campus ministries at their respective schools. Joining Our Neighbors to Feed the Hungry

On Sunday, Sept. 9, over 100 volunteers (40 ULC, 24 Campus Ministry, 40 Islamic Center) packaged 10,000 dehydrated meals in less than two hours! We scooped and poured soy meal, rice, vegetables and vitamins into plastic

bags; sealed the bags; counted and boxed them. The contents of each bag, when mixed with boiling water, can feed six children or three adults.

One-third of these packages (over 3,000 meals) stayed in our community. Again this year we delivered them to the MSU Student Food Bank. Nicole Edmonds,

Director of the food bank said that she is "thrilled" to get the donation and appreciates us thinking of them again this year. The remaining twothirds of the food goes to those in need around the state, nation and world, including food packages that will likely be used for Hurricane Florence relief. Following the service project, the Islamic Center hosted a delicious lunch catered by Sultans. This is the fourth year of a joint ULC/Islamic Center food packing event. We alternate locations, so our 5th annual event will be hosted at ULC

in 2019. It was wonderful to see how friendships have evolved since we have started working together. There was lots of conversation and laughter (and cheering starting in Pastor Haley Vay's corner of the room). Thank you to everyone who made this day a great success!

Making Sense of the Cross, Meet our Student **Associates & Annual Meeting Review**

If you have never attended the Sunday Adult Forum, this is the year to start, as we kick off with a fascinating theological series! Forum is open to all and requires no advance preparation or homework! Join us each Sunday from 9:40 - 10:30 a.m. in the Fireside Room.

Beginning Sept. 30 Pastor Gary will present a six-part study series, entitled "Making Sense of the Cross." This DVD-based series presented by David Lose through AugsbergFortress.com will allow ample time for questions and discussion. (No problem if you cannot attend all six! Each part can easily stand alone.)

"Making Sense of the Cross:" The cross is clearly at the center of our faith, yet Christians and other people of faith have had questions about it ever since the crucifixion and resurrection. For example, what does God look like through the lens of the cross? What, exactly, did God do through the person of Jesus and how does this shape our lives today? What have Christians, including the gospel writers, said about the cross through the centuries? How does Luther's Theology of the Cross relate to our sense of God as all powerful and allknowing?





2018 Local Benevolence Grants

Lead Management Team Notes

The Lead Management Team met on Wednesday, Sept 5. The following are highlights from the meeting that are not covered in other areas of this month's Lux.

Lead Pastor's Report - Pastor Gary Bunge: We are planning to receive new members on Sunday, Oct. 7 during worship. We have a potential group of 17 to 19 people. I attended the ELCA Senior Pastor Training event in Chicago. Topics were: Money and Ministry, and Visioning and Planning. While these are areas of ministry I've done a lot with over the years, it was helpful to think through these areas of ministry in the context of ULC. I'm trying to carve out some reading time to read some book recommendations from the event.

Bicycle Ministry-Gary Garbarino: I am back and working! I have three bikes ready to go in the church basement and will keep plugging away. I put a tag with my phone number on the ones that are ready in case the rider wants it adjusted. I have also suggested that the bike ministry budget be used to provide helmets to those taking bicycles. [Note: LMT suggests members donate gently used or new helmets to be distributed with each bike.]

Habitat for Humanity-Don Armstrong: I have spoken with HFH Lansing every week or so, asking what projects we could work on and they have not returned calls or emails.

Social Action-Bryan Rahe: The food distribution in August served 55 households. The distribution was held outside. Another fundraiser for Michigan Refugee Hope was held at First Lutheran in Muskegon. About 100 people attended and about \$3,000 was raised. The July Personal Needs Collection yielded: 159 full size items, \$20 in cash, and a medium sized Ziploc containing hotel toiletries. Since restarting the ink cartridge collection, we have gotten \$37 in cash for used cartridges.

Welcome Team-Barbara Riegle, Linda Trevarthen, Emily Heidrich: We are in the process of creating several promotional items to purchase with our grant money, including ULC post-it notepads and ULC magnets. We also recently purchased several more rolls of ULC-embossed ribbon (for visitor and new member gifts) and a supply of local maple syrup for visitor gifts. The last month has seen a slight surge in the giving of visitor gifts!

Facility-Dale Romsos: The contract with Myers Plumbing and Heating to install nine rooftop units was signed on Aug. 28.

Library/Archives-Connie Lenkowski: A booklet listing all of the artwork located in ULC has been added to the ULC website. It can be found under the "About Us" tab.

Office Helpers-Britny Pollard: Reception desk volunteers are needed to fill the following slots: Wednesday afternoons and both morning and afternoons on Friday. The Lux Mailing group needs a leader to coordinate the mailing day.


ULC People


